**Directions:** This assignment requires you to compare the costs of attending four different types of post-secondary institutions: a two-year community or junior college, a four-year public college in your state, a four-year private university, and a public four-year college in another state. To find the data needed to complete the assignment, go to <u>www.petersons.com</u>. First, enter the name of your city or state in the search bar and click search. The list of schools will include both public and private colleges and universities in your state. You may need to go to the college's own web site to determine if it is public or private. (Ask your teacher for help if you need assistance.) After completing the three in-state institutions, return to the home page and enter the name of another state. Select a four-year public college or university from that list.
