Performance Task				
 Students complete the TPP Profit and Loss Worksheet. The worksheet helps students understand: how both revenue and cost are affected by the TPP; that some companies stand to gain more than others, and some may in fact lose as a result of the deal, and; that in balance, the benefits of trade outweigh the costs. The data in the worksheet approximate the real-life situation, but are not technically a primary source. They draw inspiration from the report from the U.S. International Trade Commission, below.
