

America, the Beautiful

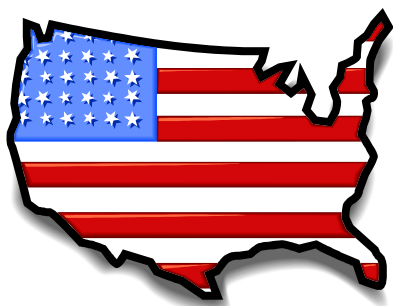
